

Knowledge and Education Including CME

1. All providers will be expected to maintain and update their knowledge and education relevant to their area of practice. It is expected that all physicians and non-physician providers will be knowledgeable about appropriate developments and enhancements in their field. Knowledge about value-based care and efficiency of care and care delivery are considered important part of the knowledge base of our providers.
2. All providers will be expected to comply with all state, JCAHO, specialty society, hospital and medical staff specifications to the quantity, frequency and type of CME that is required and to have appropriate documentation of such available at the time of credentialing and recredentialing.
3. All physicians who have completed their 10 year Board Recertification during the interval since their last reappointment will be considered to have satisfactorily met the CME requirements for reappointment.
4. All CME should be pertinent to the physician's training and experience and consistent with and supportive of the services for which they are credentialed. Earned CME that is not related to the provider's area of practice is not considered part of the CME requirement.

5. Nonphysician provider who are required to obtain CE credits will have those hours counted toward their requirements when such credits are CME credits. Other types of CE credits will not count toward the CME requirement.
